Section 1: Rules

All contests under the jurisdiction of the RIIL shall be played according to the National Federation of State High School Association Rules, except for any special rulings adopted by the RIIL and listed in this handbook below.

Section 2: Mandatory Coaches Certification & Continuing Education

- A. ALL Coaches must be appointed by their School Administration and upload their valid certificates to the Coaches' Certification website below. A coach is any adult with access to student-athletes through an education-based athletic program.
 - a. Including, but not limited to: Volunteer Coaches, Assistant Coaches, and Head Coaches.

Section 3: Medical Coverage/Emergency Action Plans

- A. Medical Coverage should be provided by the host school, be in attendance and on duty for the duration of all interscholastic scrimmages and games during the regular season and all tournament round games. The medical personnel must introduce themselves to both coaches and referee prior to the start of the game.
 - a. Pre-Game Safety Checklist
- B. Schools are responsible for providing Medical Coverage for their team throughout the playoffs, including the Semis and Finals/Championships.
- C. Home team medical coverage shall be responsible for both teams unless the visiting school provides its own medical coverage.
- D. The judgment of the medical person will be final with regard to the medical condition of a player. No player may continue to play against the medical person's advice under any circumstance.

- F. An Emergency Action Plan with clearly defined written and practice protocols as required by RI General Laws must be developed and in place at every high school.
 - a. When possible, an athletic trainer should be present at all practices and games. An athletic trainer is a key component in any strategy to minimize injury risk and optimize safety for all participants.
 - b. *Rationale:* An effective emergency action plan (EAP) must be in place as a prompt and appropriate response to any emergency situation that can save a life. The EAP should be designed and practiced to address all teams (freshman, junior varsity, and varsity) and all practice and game sites.

Section 6: Season Dates (All dates are subject to change):

- A. Score Reporting for all Regular Season and Postseason League Games: In accordance with Article 6, Section 14, all contest scores are to be reported on-line on the RIIL Website. Coaches obtain access to the system through their Athletic Director.
- B. It shall be the responsibility of school officials/administrators/supervisors to provide a safe and secure environment for the teams and officials by ensuring the playing field and sidelines are continuously cleared of **everyone** except certified & appointed coaches, team managers/scorers, student-athletes, medical personnel, and school designated personnel. Media are allowed with prior permission of the host school.

F. Regular Season Format:

- Teams will compete in ~7-9 total Meets vs. every team in their division.
- Teams will compete against every team in their Division twice for 12-14 competitions.
- Each Team will host approximately 2 meets during the regular season.
- The initial schedule will be coordinated by the Sport Director. All changes to the schedule after the schedule is released to schools will be controlled by the Athletic Directors.

G. Home teams shall set a date/time for all contests.

- If there is a conflict in the date/time of the contest with the visiting team(s) and mutual agreement cannot be reached, the visiting school Principal/Athletic Director shall submit ***a written request*** to the RIIL to review the circumstances of the disagreement and render a decision. **This must be done prior to the submission of the Home Confirmation Schedule.**
- Once the Home Confirmation Schedule is submitted, changes will not be allowed unless there are extenuating circumstances.

H. Postponement of Regular Season Varsity Games after the confirmation deadline:

- Where unusual circumstances prevail or where weather conditions are unfavorable, a game may be postponed by mutual consent of the Principals and/or Athletic Directors
- Postponed games shall be rescheduled to the next day when the teams, facility, and officials are available.
 - Includes weekends and/or school vacations.

- ii. League games must take precedent over non-league games or lesser events
 - iii. Rescheduled games must be within all other guidelines contained in this handbook and the RIIL Rules & Regulations.
- c. Additional Officials Fees for Games Changed within Two Weeks of original date/time: Article 6, Section 5
- I. Practice Limitations:
 - a. Preseason Practice Limitations are also located in Heat Acclimatization: Article 7, Section 3
 - b. Scrimmages allowed after 5 days of practice
 - c. Games allowed after 10 days of practice
- J. Rosters shall be completed via the RIIL website and made available to the public no later than 10 days after the start of practice. Rosters must be updated when students are added/removed from the team.
 - a. Rosters must include: name & grade..

Section 7: Postseason Qualification & Format:

- A. State Team Championships (D1 & D2):
 - a. Qualification/Standards for team and individual participation will remain exactly the same as in the past.
 - b. A Team's W-L record in league competitions will be used to qualify for the state championship. The Top-4 Teams in each Division will qualify for the State Championship meet.
 - c. Division 1 and Division 2 will each have a Championship Meet designed exclusively for the team championship. Standards will be established in each of the four events. Teams will compete in Olympic order according to the standings. If there is a tie for 1st - 3rd a coin flip will be used for event placement in the team meet. If there is a tie for 4th place a tiebreaker meet will take place.
- B. State Individual Championship Meet:
 - a. The Top individuals in each event throughout the season will also qualify for the Individual State Championship based on the standards established at the beginning of the season.
 - b. The Individual Championship Meet is designed exclusively for individual competition. Standards will be established in each of the four events:
 - i. Vault: 8.5
 - ii. Bars: 7.8
 - iii. Beam: 8.2
 - iv. Floor: 8.3
 - v. All Around: 32.8 with no score lower than a 6.5
 - c. All athletes who exceed the standard in three separate regular season meets will qualify to participate. The RIIL will recognize the Top-8 competitors in each of the four events and the Top-8 All-Around for those gymnasts who qualify in all four events.

Section 8: RIIL Rules & Regulations Specific to Gymnastics

- A. Six (6) gymnasts can compete per event plus one additional gymnast may be allowed to exhibition.
- B. Top 4 female scores per event will count towards the final meet score. Males are allowed to compete although their score cannot be used toward the team score they can qualify as an individual gymnast.
- C. Score cards are to be provided by the coaches at each meet.
- D. Electronic Scoring will be used to keep track of the meet results and qualifiers
- E. All scores are to be placed on the RIIL site within 24 hours and sent to the statistician, Elaine Lyden
- F. All State and All Division accolades are determined by averaging the top 3 scores the gymnast achieved during the regular and post season meets.
- G. Gymnasts are then ranked by the statistician.
- H. The top 6 gymnasts from both divisions will receive All State first team honors, the next 6 will receive All State second team honors.
- I. All divisions are broken into Division 1 and Division 2. The top 6 gymnasts from each division will receive All Division first team honors, the next 6 will receive All Division second team honors and the next 6 thereafter will receive All Division third team honors
- J. Note: Individuals are placed into divisional categories based on if they make it to the state championship meet or not.

Section 9: Officials

- A. RIIL assigned official's authority extends to pre and post-game oversight. Fighting and unsportsmanlike penalties will always be within the authority of the officials at the contest site.
- B. Police protection, when necessary, must be provided by the home school. The home school is responsible for all crowd control measures. There is an urgent need for increasing vigilance in this matter. Schools must make every effort to ensure that players, officials, and spectators are protected. The duties of the police will be determined and outlined by the home school.
- C. The home team should provide an adult game supervisor at all home events. An adult game supervisor must be present at ice hockey, basketball, field hockey, lacrosse, baseball, softball, football, soccer, volleyball and wrestling contests. The supervisor shall not be a student, nor a coach involved with the game. The supervisor shall identify themselves to the game officials thirty (30) minutes prior to the start of the game. The supervisor shall be responsible for game administration and crowd control. They should notify the police, and event staff to seek appropriate assistance when applicable. In the event of a problem, the Principal/Athletic Director must notify the RIIL office the next day and submit a written report detailing the incident(s).
